Today, the *U.S. Postal Service* is issuing a stamp commemorating the 150th birthday of one of America's most famous and beloved authors, William Sydney Porter, also known as "O. Henry."

Enclosed, you will find an application for the granting of a posthumous presidential pardon on Mr. Porter's behalf. The application and accompanying materials were put together by myself and Scott Henson.

We well understand that it is the "general policy" of the Department of Justice "not to accept for processing applications for posthumous pardons for federal convictions."
